Whipps Cross Hospital

Making it work well into the future

Overview

Built in 1903 as the West Ham Union Infirmary, now it's a very busy hospital seeing more than 1,600 patients treated every day. Every year we see:

Over 150,000 A&E and urgent care attendances

400,000 outpatients

5,000 births

Over 42,000 admissions to the c.600 beds.

209,000 patients receive care every year

Our Vision

- Our vision - to become a pioneer in delivering joined up care for our local population - cannot be fully realised without the redevelopment of the Whipps

An integrated health, social care and wellbeing campus

Bring many elements of a patient's journey together

A centre of best practice renowned for the joined up care and treatment of older people.

Other facilities could also support the way core services are delivered on the site - a thriving local community asset.

Support the wider economic regeneration of the local area



Our Vision: Older People's Services

Centre of best practice

Integrated health, social care and wellbeing campus

'Health village' with acute beds as well as the potential for step down and nursing home beds

Other services to support older people, possibly including third sector, sheltered and affordable housing, and prevention services

A patient's journey will be defined by needs rather than by organisational boundaries



What's happened so far?

- Gathered ideas from our staff
- Agreed a **framework for engaging** with patients, the public and their representatives
- We have developed a **Strategic Outline Business Case (SOC)** that clearly sets out the case for change, the vision for the future of Whipps Cross and a high-level assessment of the capital requirements.



Engagement and Involvement

- ‘**Big conversation**’ in October 2016
- Regular **newsletter** - available online and in the hospital, which provides updates
- We are setting up a **Community Involvement Group** to capture the views of local people and ensure that detailed plans for the future of Whipps Cross are shaped by local people



Strategic Outline Case (SOC)

- Establishes the need for the proposal and to provide a suggested way forward to develop the case (at the Outline Business Case (OBC) stage).
- A successful SOC represents a **decision to commit resource** and additional costs to the development of an OBC.
- In the context of the Whipps Cross Redevelopment Programme, the SOC provides **sufficient evidence to support further investment** in the development of an OBC.
- The SOC does not do a detailed economic analysis or investigation of the commercial, financial and management arrangements at this stage.



Next Steps

- We need the **support** of NHS Improvement and the Department of Health to continue to work up our strategy
- If NHS Improvement and Department of Health are satisfied with the way the work is developing, we will then need to draw up an Outline Business Case (OBC) over the next 12-18 months with **more detailed ideas**. It would need to be endorsed by all of the organisations involved
- We would then need that detailed business case to be approved by the Department of Health and HM Treasury before we **finalise a plan** ahead of the redevelopment of the Whipps Cross site



In Summary

- The case for redevelopment is powerful - it is clear that Whipps Cross needs a new hospital
- Doing nothing is significantly more expensive than doing something
- Our vision can only be achieved by working in partnership
- by working together we can deliver a radical new approach to local health and care.
